The Heart of Giving

hen I was a young girl, often my grandparents would drive me to church. I remember riding in the back of their blue and white DeSota with the plastic cover on the back seat for protection. I also remember being ready for church in my Sunday best dress with white stockings and black patent leather shoes. But, the one thing I remember most was the quarter Grandma and Grandpa would give me for the offering. I loved watching as the ushers passed the offering plates in the rows ahead of me. I was eager for them to get to my row so I could put my shiny quarter in the wooden plate.

As I look back, I realize it wasn't much in the way of an offering, but it was an incredible lesson teaching me the importance of giving to the church. It led to my practice of tithing my babysitting money from Saturday night gigs as a teen. Then I felt good because I'd put in a whole two dollars.

As I grew and earned more, the practice of giving has stuck with me. Even when money has been tight, I remember tithing as a spiritual practice that says "I trust God to care for me regardless of my circumstances."

November is one of the times we take a look at our stewardship in the church. How are we being good stewards of what God has entrusted to us? Our stewardship consists of not just money but also our time and talents.



As you might know, Jesus spent a lot of time talking about money because where we spend our money tells us a lot about our priorities. Though it may sometimes be an uncomfortable topic of discussion, talking about money and stewardship is an important aspect of our growth as disciples.

This month, I invite you to consider your heart as it concerns giving. Join with me in wondering about our attitude towards tithing and stewardship. Do we avoid and cringe? Do we eagerly await the chance to put in your coins? Is there some other reaction?

In all of these places, know that no matter where we are, God loves us and invites us to take steps closer to the very best of who God is calling us to be!

Fulfilling Our Scriptural Imperatives

On Sunday, October 27, the Minnesota UMC Conference Big Waters District Superintendent, Susan Nienaber, visited with the members of the Staff Pastor Parish Relations (SPPR) Committee and Pastor

Katherine.



The DS is the clergy member employment supervisor and visits with the Pastor and SPPR Committee members each fall. The purpose of this visit is a check-in by the DS to receive feedback on how we feel our Pastor, along with

the Asbury congregation, is becoming a vital expression of fulfilling our scriptural imperatives to:

- Grow in love of God and neighbor (the Great Commandment, *Matthew 22:37-40*)
- Reach new people (the Great Commission, *Matthew 28:19-20*)
- Heal a broken world (the Great Proclamation, *Luke 4:16-21*)

Prior to the visit, the SPPR Committee completes a feedback worksheet outlining responses to those imperatives.

It is important that in everything we do at Asbury from pasties to meatballs to donuts to apple pies, rummage sales to worship, the neighborhood picnic to youth and adult education, we are thoughtful about how the activity might be responding to one or more of the imperatives listed above.

Additionally, each pastor in the Big Waters District completes their own self-review form, establishes goals for their ministry, and has an in-depth conversation with the DS. Some of that conversation and the SPPR Committee feedback includes responses to how and how effectively our pastor is equipping Asbury to fulfill the scriptural imperatives of the stated UMC Minnesota Conference vision.

CHUM SuperShelf

Exciting changes are coming to the CHUM Food Shelf through a program called **SuperShelf**. The mission of SuperShelf is to transform food shelves, creating welcoming environments for communities to access appealing, healthy food.

SuperShelf comes with standards for stocking healthy foods. It has always been important for the CHUM Food Shelf to provide healthful foods, and Scott Van Daele, CHUM's Director of Distributive Services, has work diligently to find more sources for fresh produce and whole grains such as brown rice, whole grain pasta and oatmeal.

Through SuperShelf, CHUM also will offer a new "Cooking & Baking" section with oil, spices and other ingredients needed to create nutritious, homeprepared meals.

The new program aims to create a welcoming, positive, grocery store-like experience. Behavioral economics are used to make the healthiest choices the most appealing and easy to choose. To accomplish these goals, several changes are planned for CHUM's Food Shelf shopping area. It will be expanded and arranged for better flow. New shelves, paint, signs, and cleaning will brighten the space.

Tentative dates for the transformation of the shopping area are at the end of October, during which time the downtown Food Shelf will be closed. Sign-up sheets for volunteers will be posted to help with tasks such as moving shelves, moving stock, cleaning and painting. The timeline may need to be adjusted, but the Food Shelf should be open by Thanksgiving!
