Why Ashes On Ash Wednesday?

A sh Wednesday, the first day of Lent, falls on February 22 this year. During worship services ashes (often made by burning branches from the previous Palm Sunday) will be used to make a cross on the forehead. Why ashes? Traditionally, they're a sign of mourning,



humiliation and penitence. Ashes also represent the frailty and temporary nature of human life ("You are dust, and to dust you shall return," Genesis 3:19). Christians are pained because their sins led to Jesus' death. With repentant hearts, they begin the season of Lent, knowing that it leads to Jesus' resurrection on Easter Sunday.

For Ash Wednesday, throughout the 40 days of Lent, on Easter Sunday and each day, take time to pause for prayer. Please pray that God's Spirit will guide and direct us and pray for those who come to Asbury's worship service (either in person or online) that they be encouraged and blessed in their journey with God.

CHUM Food Shelf Items Most Needed

E arlier last year CHUM's food shelves were close to completely empty. In December, 50,000 pounds of food was received which served almost 1,000 individuals (600 families) during the holiday season, typically a very hard time for a lot of people.

As CHUM moves into 2023, they are seeing the need for food grow in Duluth. In 2022, the need was higher than that of previous years and this trend is expected to continue. Here is a list of CHUM's most needed items. Asbury UMC has a shopping cart at the back of the church to gather items if you would like to help.

been active in their communities and Asbury UMC for all of these vears, the UWF needed to recognize lives well lived.

Lois Stromgren and Barbara Downs came to Asbury UMC in 1992 when the Asbury Methodist Episcopal Church, Central Avenue Methodist Church and Bethany Methodist Church merged.

While at Central Avenue Methodist Church both ladies taught third grade Sunday school together. They have been active in the UWF for over 30 years and have served on it's board for many years. Lois is credited with being the chair of the funeral receptions for many years and was the UWF's treasurer for over 25 years. She also is responsible for bringing the donut recipe and sale to Asbury. Barb served as UWF secretary for many years and then handled the group's correspondence for many years.

Lois and Barb are still active in all of Asbury's projects and activities. At 90 plus, they still participate in rolling donuts, apple pie and pasty crusts. They are lovingly referred to as the "Holy Rollers." Both have been mentors and role models for many individuals at Asbury UMC.

Charles Salvatore (named after his grandfather) Crumb received UWF's Special Mission Recognition Award. Charles is a busy man around Asbury. He is a member of the Garden Team putting long hours into beautifying the church's gardens and grounds. He quickly learned how to shrink wrap and helps out wrapping pasties and apple pies. You will also see him frying donuts. Charles heeds the advice of his maternal Italian grandmother to "helpa you' mother" wherever he can. Thus, he was there to help when there was a major leak in the church's back storage room, helps hang decorations for the Fall Pantry and Hanging of the Green, played a shepherd in the Christmas Program and is a member of the Asbury Singers and the Men's Coffee Group pitching in with other chores around the church.

Charles joined Asbury UMC in the spring of 2021 after retiring from a 30-year bookkeeping career in Washington, DC. His particular specialty was in bookkeeping for small non-profits and public interest concerns that were predominately women operated and/or owned. He has professed that his primary concern in life is about spiritual growth which was partly initiated through maturing via the AA 12-step recovery program, two years of psychotherapy and a long-time relationship with his partner, Michael. For over 20 years they have remained together discovering the meaning of life.

UWF Meetings


